	use of AI-based tools in writing research papers: (1) ethical/moral, (2) critical/rational,	
	and (3) lack of originality which is reflected in the SON Plagiarism Policy. Use AI with	
	caution, but add to your references that it was used, and how it was used. Greater than	
	30% AI use on a paper will be reflected in your grade. If it is used for grammar and	
	flow of content, all points in that area in the rubric will be subtracted. If plagiarism is	
	detected and AI is used to write the paper, the SON policy will be followed for	
	plagiarism. The student is responsible for understanding what AI is and what AI is not.
