Catalog Description	This final capstone course in the Nurse-Midwifery / Women's Health Nurse Practitioner sequence, prepares students to merge the professional role and responsibilities of clinical management in transitioning to independent, full-scope practice as a nurse-midwife / women's health nurse practitioner. This clinical rotation allows the student to demonstrate a synthesis of the theoretical, holistic and research- based knowledge, along with their clinical skills in the clinical management of women in the practice setting. Emphasis is on application of the nurse midwifery / nurse practitioner process and health advocacy

<p>Rounding Policy (policy 3003): Rounding for this course will occur only with the final average grade for the course. There will be no rounding of exam grades or other written assignments during the semester. If the final course average to the nearest tenth is 0 .5 or more, the final course grade will be rounded up to the next whole number (i.e. 88.5 would be rounded to 89)</p> <p>Progression requirement (policy (3001): The student MUST obtain a grade of “B” or higher in all clinical nursing courses. A grade of “C,” “D,” or “F” is considered a course failure. Students may petition for readmission after one course failure. After two course failures students are dismissed from the program.</p>

Project Concert	The School of Nursing is currently using Project Concert for clinical tracking and evaluation. The Graduate Clinical Coordinator, Graduate Administrative Assistant, and course faculty will provide program and course specific information regarding use.
Artificial intelligence (AI)	Turnitin has the capability to track use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in the writing. The student cannot see the percentage, but faculty can. AI can benefit a researcher by providing instantaneous gathering of information from vast amounts of data, but this technology still has a machine and not human factor, therefore may not be able to fully understand the complexities of a research topic. AI can miss context and totally misrepresent the information it is providing to the user. There are 3 main concerns with use of AI-based tools in writing research papers: (1) ethical/moral, (2) critical/rational, and (3) lack of originality which is reflected in the SON Plagiarism Policy. Use AI with caution, but add to your references that it was used, and how it was used. Greater than 30% AI use on a paper will be reflected in your grade. If it is used for grammar and flow of content, all points in that area in the rubric will be subtracted. If plagiarism is detected and AI is used to write the paper, the SON policy will be followed for plagiarism. The student is responsible for understanding what AI is and what AI is not.
